CHARITY, TRUTH, AND LIFE (II)

For Christians of the early 21st century, marooned in the culture and ideology of our time, the passions of the martyrs – ancient reports of arrest, trial, torture, and death – often seem very strange. We enjoy a little consumerized otherness in food or travel, but the otherness of the past, of our own culture's roots, baffles and repels us. We are tempted to ascribe that difference to our own intellectual or cultural superiority. Putting aside such self-flattering explanations, we might rather consider it a sign of our own alienation from the history that has made us what we are, and spur ourselves to study.

The passions of the martyrs record the moment when the sharp-edged clarity of their testimony to Christ challenged the religion of the ancient empire. What is easy to miss, at the distance of many centuries, is the precise nature of this challenge: for the claim of the Christians is that the longing expressed in ancient religion and philosophy, the longing for the liberation of the soul, to the life of the gods, is fulfilled by the mediation of Christ. In Christ is accomplished what we find described in Book VII of *The Republic*: the deliverance of the soul from its bondage to the flickering shadows of unreality, its conversion by grace to that which truly is, and its ascent towards the dazzling light of the ineffable first principle called “the one” or “the good” or “god” or even “father” and “creator”. One who has made that ascent shares the life of

the gods, is truly virtuous, happy, and free. In the knowledge of truth, man finds life everlasting.

When the martyrs threw down their challenge to the officials and peoples of the empire, they did so as free men come to liberate their former fellow-slaves from the demonic delusions of unreality. Alban took his interrogation as occasion for testimony to the Father of Christ, “the true and living God who created all things”. Invited to offer sacrifice to the pagan gods if he wished to live, Alban replied: “The sacrifices which you offer to devils cannot help their votaries nor fulfil the desires and petitions of their suppliants: on the contrary, he who has offered sacrifices to these images will receive eternal punishment in hell as their reward”. The confession of one God, the Creator, the polemic against idolatry, is expressed in language that is Biblical; but it is also Hellenic. Moses and Plato alike find their fulfillment in Christ, the Saviour of Jews and Greeks, of Israel and the Gentile nations.

Alban dressed himself in the long robe (the alb), the distinctive garb of the Christian priest and thus dressed gave himself up to the soldiers sent to arrest the priest to whom he had given refuge. It was a daring imposture, designed to permit the escape of the man who had taught him this way of salvation. This

courageous act was a function of substitutionary love – the charity by which Christ represents us before the Father, and through which we participate in him. As the priest, by his office, represents the person of Christ – who himself stood in our place, as our representative – so Alban, dressed in the priest’s long robe, takes on the *persona* of the priest, and in fulfillment of the priestly office offers himself in the priest’s place. What Christ has done for us – set forth in the word and sacraments and teaching of the priest – Christ also accomplishes in us, and we (at least, the martyrs and confessors) imitate. Man is caught up into Christ’s sacrifice, into the freedom and power of love. In Alban’s action he testified, therefore, to Christ, who gave himself for us, whose Spirit conforms us to him, and whose “name” (*Christianus*) he confessed. “Whosoever shall confess me before men, him will I confess also before my Father which is in heaven” (Matthew 10:32).

Two miracles are recorded of Alban’s progress to the green and flowery hillside of his execution (itself a classical topos of the *locus amoenus*, the ‘pleasant place’, that symbolizes paradise). The river in his way dries up temporarily to allow his passage, and on the hill a spring bursts forth to quench his thirst. These miracles echo the miracles that marked Israel’s exodus through the sea and the desert on their way to the promised land, and we may consider them pious embroidery. Perhaps so; but they express symbolically the conviction expressed in Alban’s own testimony, that in the faith of the martyrs the exodus accomplished by Christ in his death and resurrection was fulfilled in them. To die for the knowledge of the truth was not loss but gain: it was to complete one’s passage from the Egypt of spiritual bondage, into the promised land

of everlasting life – from unreality to reality. Thus, as the ancient prayer puts it, what we pray for is always “in this world knowledge of thy *truth*, and in the world to come *life everlasting*”. GGD
