The Men of St Johns held their annual dinner meeting in September. Our very own, Dr. Brian Taylor shared photographs and his thoughts, observations and memories of the choirs trip to Wells Cathedral this summer. He concluded by thanking the Men for their support.

Rector's Musings: Modernist or Modern?

Make no mistake. I think there is some very fine modernist architecture - reworkings and developments of ideas pioneered by Wright, Le Corbusier, Gropius, Mies, Johnson, et al. One of the best local examples is Moshe Safdie's Jepson Museum. But modernism has also produced some of the dullest most inhumane slabs in existence. Just compare the present courthouse with its predecessors on Wright Square. On a recent visit to Washington D. C. I had the opportunity to compare the modernist buildings on the Mall with their neo-classical neighbours - many of them also 20th century structures. Of the twentieth century structures it is, however, the neo-classical structures that win hands down: John Russell Pope's National Gallery and Jefferson Memorial, Henry Bacon's Lincoln Memorial, Cass Gilbert's Supreme Court. What is remarkable about them is their freshness and humanity. These are not tired re-treads of a played-out tradition. Compare the National Gallery to its east wing, designed by the celebrated modernist I. M. Pei, or its neighbour across the mall, the Air and Space Museum designed by Gyo Obata. They are all very large buildings clad in pale pink Tennessee marble. But Pei's and Obata's buildings - gigantic chunks of geometry - are strangely inert and insubstantial. (The scaffolding currently surrounding Pei's building, whose marble cladding is being replaced only forty years after its construction, is actually enlivening.) By contrast, Pope's building lives and breathes, it has weight and light and proportion. It may not be modernist, but it is modern.

O'Brien's Orations: Out of Africa

““Why is it,’ asked Graca Machel, former Mozambique education minister, widow of President Machel, and now the wife of Nelson Mandela, ‘that the worst of everything that is evil and inhuman is to be found in Africa? What is wrong with us Africans?”

So the white African Alexandra Fuller, now living in America, quoting Machel’s searing introspection in her mesmerising

Scribbling the Cat: Travels with an African Soldier. I had to keep this title away from my literate cat, as scribbling is apparently a euphemism for being offed! Part memoir, part travelogue, part meditation on the ravages of war and the redemption of all those implicated; the cat of the title is Fuller herself, who curiously set out with the mysterious and tortured K, to retrace his steps through the scribbling fields of the former Rhodesia(Zimbabwe) and Mozambique. Unforgettable.

Don't Let's Go to the Dogs Tonight: An African Childhood. The predecessor of the latter(I happened to read it first), this is Fuller’s childhood memoir per se in Rhodesia-during and after the bloody civil war of the seventies, Malawi and Zambia. She evokes the sights, tastes and smells of central Africa as if you were there. Her unvarnished portrayal of her redoubtable British parents struggling to make a go farming amidst turmoil of just about every description, is humbling and extremely moving. The writing is gorgeous.

Of Gods and Men. This 2010 French winner of the Cannes Film Festival’s Grand Prix award, is set in a different part of Africa, Algeria. Based in fact, it tells the story of eight Trappist monks who must weigh the costs of staying in their monastery where they minister to the Muslim population of a poor mountain village, or suffer possible martyrdom at the hands of militant extremists. In French and Arabic with English subtitles. Not to be missed.







William Ralston Listening Library and Archive

Sewanee, The University of the South, recently opened The William Ralston Music Listening Library and Archive in the DuPont Library. The cherry-paneled listening room is equipped with the world's top audio and video components. Father Ralston had assembled one of the finest, most comprehensive private collections of classical music in the United States. The listening room holds over 10,000 records as well as rare scores and books about music. The library provides headphone listening stations, turntables, CD players, loudspeakers, and display areas for art and music-related materials. The University also has a collection of 5,000 audio recordings in an adjacent room. A 3,000 square reading room containing the DuPont Library's music book and scores completes The Ralston Library.

Father Ralston expressed in his will his desire for his collection to be featured and available to the public. He wanted his collection to be enjoyed by serious students of music as well as casual listeners. It is free and open to all. The Library and Archive is one of the finest facilities of its kind at any college or university in America. Thomas Carlson, professor of English, has been instrumental in ensuring the culmination of Father Ralston's dream which was supported in part by donations from parishioners at St. John's, especially the Hungerpiller family.
